

WHAT'S UP?



Anything goes! Well, almost anything. That's the best way to describe **The Acoustinauts**. They do acid rock, country, folk — all acoustically. They do a version of Hendrix' "Purple Haze" (see YEAH! #3) that must be heard to be believed. Joe (Don't Mention Almost Live) Guppy leads this band in a tongue-in-cheek style. Not much to dance to, but plenty of good times. (Sunday, 4 p.m., Bumber Brewhaus)

Applied Science applies technology to music and ends up with funky electro-pop. I've never actually heard them, but they were the first band to send us a promo pack when we asked for them two weeks ago, so promptness must count for something. (Sunday, 1 p.m., Hotspurs Stage)

This is a rare chance to see Bell & James, acclaimed R 'n' B songwriters of hits by the Spinners and the O'Jays, and of their own hits "Shakedown" and "Living It Up (Friday Night)." (Sunday, 8 p.m., Bumber Brewhaus)

Duffy Bishop and the Rhythm Dogs are a hot R 'n' B revue which invariably draws huge crowds. (Saturday, 2:30 p.m., Blues Stage)

Blackwood-Laird: singer/songwriter/keyboardist Maggie Laird, singer/songwriter/ guitarist Morgan Blackwood, and band do danceable modern rock. They had the local hit, "Leon." (Saturday, 2 p.m., Hotspurs Stage)

Bloody Mary is formerly Spirits West, reformed as a three piece. Debuting at Bumbershoot, this country-influenced roots-rock band has a sound reminiscent of the Allies. Led by singer "Bob, the Harley Sex God," Bloody Mary promises to offer unpretentious danceable no-frills rock 'n' roll.

(Friday, 6:00 p.m., Hotspurs Stage)

Who are **The Borgvards**? I've never heard of them. The official Bumbershoot program says they have a song on KJET's playlist, and describes their sound as "modern rock 'n' roll." I guess I just don't listen to the radio often enough ... (Saturday, 1 p.m., Hotspurs Stage)

The Center for Disease Control Boys promise to bring to Bumbershoot just the type of music one would expect to hear at his joyous summer festival. Their name suggests a hard-edged punk band, when in fact they're a seven-person band which pumps out rockabilly tunes. They should be a potpourri of musical fun as they strum away at their hardly distorted guitars and work their fingers to the bone playing the washboard. Go see these guys if you're into happy music and are out to have a good time. (Monday, 2 p.m., Hotspurs Rock 'n' Ribs Stage)

This will be Chemistry
Set's first Bumbershoot performance. The band formed from
former members of the Young
Pioneers, the Suspicions, and
the Dwindles a year ago. They
play '80's psychedelic-influenced
guitar riffs with a driving rhythmic
background. Although mostly
original, they could do some covers
that will surprise you (like Led Zeppelin). (Monday, 3:15 p.m.,

Hotspurs Stage)

Cool'R is a bunch of hot musicians from Portland who all want to be Prince. Their danceable modern funky rock is featured on their LP, Let's Talk About It. (Friday, 8 p.m., Bumber Brewhaus)

In the Northwest, the Crazy 8's are gods; this must be why they got the opening slot at the Nona Hendryx show. Their frenzied, yet thoughtful ska will make you dance, or else. If you can't dance to these guys, you should be home playing Yahtzee with your grandma. (Sunday, 7:30 p.m., Miller Mainstage)

Robert Cray: Turn on MTV. Turn on your radio. Hear that bluesy guitar? That is Robert Cray, sometime Seattle resident. Local boy makes very good, indeed. (Monday, 1 p.m., Miller Mainstage)

If Danger Bunny had sent us a promo pack, I might be able to say something about them. As it is, I've never heard them and don't have any idea what they might sound like. Go see them — you might be surprised. (Sunday, 2 p.m., Hotspurs Stage)

The **Defenders** are real live Jamaicans, formerly of The Gladiators. They're now living in Seattle and bringing their brand of reggae to large local crowds nearly every weekend. (Saturday, 6 p.m., Hotspurs Stage)

More Bumberviews

I had to laugh when I read the Different Ones' desciption in the Bumbershoot program: "Progressive rock from the very dif-ferent." The band features three guitarists (including Fastbacks madman Kurt Bloch) and a violinist; that makes them "different," I suppose, but they write and sing some wonderful pop songs, including KJET hits "Don't Forget My Name" and "Edge of Heaven." (Sunday, 4:30 p.m., Hotspurs Stage)

Some of us first saw Edison Jones on MTV, where they were Basement Tapes finalists. They've often been compared to Hall and Oates in style: very slick, very polished, very tight. (Monday, 8 p.m., Bumber Brew-

haus)

What can you say about the Fastbacks? They've often been described as one of the hottest "hard pop" bands to come out of Seattle in years. With Kim Warnick and Lulu Gargiulo on vocals, this band comes up with great harmonies and a driving sound. Kurt Bloch and Gargiulo provide strong to screaming guitar work, while Warnick on bass and newcomer Nate Johnson on drums form a top-flight rhythm team. Their album ... And His Orchestra, recently drew rave reviews from Greil Marcus in The Village Voice, and Bloch was the first person to appear on the cover of YEAH! (see YEAH! #2). (Saturday, 3:15 p.m., Hotspurs Rock 'n' Ribs Stage)

The F-Holes feature roots rock 'n' roll - hard, fast, and a little dirty. Nothing cute about this band, just a rockin' good time! They have a style that leans a little toward the Ramones, but a soul that leans more toward Carl Perkins or Jerry Lee Lewis. (Friday, 5:15

p.m., Bumber Brewhaus)

The First Thought is Seattle's answer to the Cure or the Chameleons, with their gloomy, progressive pop music. Thanks to a newly diversified, strong sound, some possible label recording opportunities are sending the band's optimism sky-high. Unfortunately,

their show is scheduled opposite Crowded House's Coliseum extravaganza, so few may be around to dance themselves into a moody little frenzy. (Monday, 7:30 p.m., Hotspurs Rock 'n' Ribs Stage.)

Green Pajamas is a psychedelic retro band mixing Sergeant Pepper era riffs with modern beats. While evoking a more nostalgic time, this music is definitely for dancing in the present filled with hooks, and miles above the average guitar hero band. Their new LP Book of Hours has received critical praise; our editor especially likes the song "Bang Bang You're Dead." (Saturday, 4:30 p.m., Hotspurs Stage)

The Gospel Fireballs are an amazing a cappella duo who perform a mix of traditionals and originals. They've opened for Mojo Nixon and Jonathan Richman. (Sunday, 1 p.m., Bagley Wright Theater)

Heliotroupe is a band based out of Olympia. They have recently put out an album, Anything Under The Sun, which has received some airplay on KJET. Their music is rock with an 80's folk sound. (Friday, 2 p.m., Hotspurs Rock 'n' Ribs Stage)

If you've worn your copy of Paul Simon's Graceland down to nothing, go see Je Ka Jo, a 12piece African pop band. When they played at the Mural Amphitheater a couple of weeks ago, they got a ton of people dancing. (Sunday, 6 p.m., Bumbrella Stage)

At the last moment before we went to press, we were told that **The Life** would be performing in place of **Pure Joy**. To be completely honest, I'd rather see the Life anyway. Whatever you do, don't compare lead vocalist Jimm McIver to Jim Morrison — just enjoy the band's energetic performance. (Friday, 4:30 p.m., Hotspurs Stage)

I'd like to talk about Life In General without mentioning the three original members were the legendary Seattle band X-15 that performed "Vaporized." They may still do some of the old material, but they've grown far beyond that. Singer Kelly is one of the most powerful male vocalists in Seattle, and the band recently had some airplay on KJET with their single, "Rebirth." (Sunday, 6 p.m., Hotspurs Stage)

The Lost Falcons, with their original rockin' blues, have backed up Screamin' Jay Hawkins. (Saturday, 5:15 p.m., Bumber

Brewhaus)

Melting Fish will appear for the first time as a four-piece band, with a new drummer. They're featured on the Lowlife compilation album. (Monday, 1 p.m., Hotspurs Stage)

Mistrust will be the only heavy metal band playing Bumbershoot. If you want to see big hair, this is your chance. Generally recognized as the top regional metal band, the group has a successful album out, Spin The World. (Friday, 1 p.m., Hotspurs Stage)

I Like Moving Parts despite my own better judgment.

Their music, basic "modern pop," is hook-filled and great to dance to. Sometimes they remind me of INXS. What do you think? (Monday, 7:30, Miller Mainstage, opening for Crowded House.)

Mr. Edate wins my vote for favorite new band name. As for their music, your guess is as good as mine — I've never heard them. (Monday, 4 p.m., Bumber

Brewhaus)

Napalm Beach is a band for the strong of eardrum. Their music has a strong rock feel, edging on hardcore. They've put out an album, titled Napalm Beach.

Although only a three-piece, this band kicks out a lot of sound. Be prepared for a rockin' show.


(Friday, 3:15 p.m., Hotspurs Rock'n' Ribs Stage)

The lead singer for Rebel Rousers has got to be the meanest, scariest dude this side of the abovementioned Joey Kline, but boy, can he sing. This guy definitely has Elvis in his soul. Solid rocking rockabilly. Just go, close your eyes and dance, dance, dance. (Monday, 5:45, Bumber Brewhaus)

Red Dress features eccentric lead singer Gary Minkler. This funk/rock outfit performs tight arrangements of original off-the-wall tunes. With solid, strong rhythms overlapped by excellent vocals, this is music for educated ears and happy feet. They most likely will perform favorites such as "Beat that Bad Bunch Out" and "I Like To Eat My Mousies Raw" and the legendary "Bob is a Robot." (Saturday, 8:00 p.m., Bumber Brewhaus)

For over four years Room
Nine has been toughing it out in
local clubs getting as much
recognition as the average band in
Seattle — next to zilch. The band
has a new album (entitled Voices)
coming out in September, so you
can bet they'll be doing their best to

Tall Tales is a Seattle-area trio who attempt to be an "old West" type, Cruzados sounding band, attired in cowboy boots and bolo ties. Judging from their 7" EP, Tales from Boot Hill, the band has a solid, professional sound well-suited for a sunny Bumbershoot day, though their music doesn't contain the raw power it could have. (Saturday, 6:30 p.m., Bumber Brewhaus)

The Treeclimbers: "contemporary, melodic rock," whatever that means. (Monday, 4:30 p.m., Hotspurs Stage)

Variant Cause is modern, danceable rock with an edge: your

basic cross between Van Halen, Sonic Youth, and Abba (?—ed.).
Their first album featured the hits "I Live By The Freeway" and "You Put Me in the Hospital." Bring an orange traffic cone and sing along with Jan. (Sunday, 7:30 p.m., Hotspurs Stage)

The Vultures create danceable instrumental rock, like modernday Ventures. Their LP is called Guitar Heroes. (Sunday, 6:30 p.m., Bumber Brewhaus)

The Walkabouts' modern folk-pop is currently occupying a spot in KJET's rotation, and one of the members was featured on the cover of *The Rocket* in December 1986. (Sunday, 3:15 p.m., Hotspurs Stage)

For those of us who think a sense of humor is necessary in original music, Weird of Mouth is a reason to keep listening. Guitarist Ken Boynton's irreverent lyrics and his comedic stage banter are full of humorous and ironic examinations of everything from religion to personal relationships. (Saturday,

4 p.m., Bumber Brewhaus)

The Young Fresh Fellows make life worth living. Scott McCaughey writes and sings classic songs, Chuck Carroll plays the best guitar I've ever heard from someone in a tie, Jim Sangster "does a good job on bass" (so says the Seattle Times, anyway), and TAD HUTCHISON IS GOD. Do not doubt this. (You won't, once you've seen him hit that fishingpole cymbal a few times.) All right, you get the point. I love this band. The only problem is that the Fellows go on exactly one and one-half hours before Crowded House, so if you see the Fellows you might not be able to get in the Coliseum show. Risk it anyway - you won't be sorry. (Monday, 6 p.m., Hotspurs Stage.)




